WALES MUST JACK UP ACT FOR ATLANTIC CHAMPIONSHIP

One thing, above all else, journalists desire from the organisers of international sports events is efficient communications. Sometimes, indifferent administration overlooks such a discipline and writers not in situ battle to keep up with news.

Alas, the 10-nation tournament hosted by the Welsh Bowls Association falls into that category – late results, no accessible team sheets, no weather notices, no team changes, no suitable images. I fact their website might not have bothered at all, so poor was the service.

No, I was not there; no funds to send hacks; I twice emailed the Welsh bowls set-up, well in advance of the event, for information and to seek pictures during and after the event; no answer of any kind was the stern reply.

Moreover, watching video of some events, the greens and their surrounds appeared to be in need of considerable TLC; I could be wrong, but it all looked pretty bleak with a dearth of spectators. Indeed, the bowls hardly seemed to take bias on either hand in one final I watched.

The Barry Athletics and Diane Powys greens appeared brown, thin and lifeless – not good enough

Since the prestigious 2019 Atlantic Championships is to be held at the same Cardiff venue, one would hope its organising committee spends considerable attention to ensuring the event is raised to a standard at least near that of those held in Cyprus over the years.

Grouch over, how about the bowls?

The Test series was contested by some of the cream of world bowls. Malaysia, Australia, Canada, USA, Ireland, South Africa, Zimbabwe, Namibia (men), Jersey, Spain, Wales – a most formidable line-up.

Between them, these teams won seven gold,



seven silver and three bronze medals of the 30 medals total available at the Commonwealth Games held at Gold Coast, Australia.

There, South Africa won three silver and two bronze – the second largest number of medals gained, except for Australia, who with five gold and two silver medals, dominated.

For Namibia (men) and Zimbabwe it was a spectacular foray by African sides seeking a stronger foothold in world bowls. A Welsh “second five” *Cymru, competed in place of the missing Namibia women and did well.

For South Africa, hovering, as usual, between brilliance and indifference, there could be few excuses about conditions or that they were undercooked – a reasonable complaint for participation at both World Bowls and indeed the Commonwealth Games.

Fraser's absence was unlikely to impact greatly in the long run, but Baker's non-appearance meant great responsibility on the men's younger brigade.



I am delighted that the man who has been groomed to assume Baker's onerous task as leader of the pack, Pierre Breitenbach, only 30, who has given evidence of his temperament, poise and skill in many major events in the last five years, did not disappoint.

His appearance in the singles and pairs finals was no fluke and he will defy the alchemists before long and turn silver into copious quantities of gold.

Having played myself (in another sport) at top level, I remember how arduous it was to make the quantum leap from national to international status.

But the selectors must be thrilled with Port Natal's Wayne Rittmuller, 36, South Africa's back-to-back National singles champion, partner of Breitenbach in the pairs and a stalwart in the fours – he must have pleased indefatigable Bowls SA executive and world class umpire Trevor Davis and the ever-ready Jessica Henderson, who accompanied the sides as manager and completed all duties to their usual high standards.

In the trips "engine room" and third in the fours, Ekurhuleni's (the former Eastern Transvaal) graceful and dashing Thinus Oelofse, at last

given a proper chance, indicated he was up to the task. At 37, he has a long future in green and gold and complements the front rank silky skills of Prince Neluonde, who at 34 is another with a grip on greatness.

After the Commonwealth Games, where SA ended with their men mysteriously ranked 10th and women fifth, an Australian journalist described Jason Evans' efforts as outstanding and wrote "...one man does not make or break a side, but Johannesburg-based Evans' efforts stood out brightly in every discipline in which he competed..."

In Cardiff he again, showed his worth and while a little older at 57, lends experience and calmness to what is in world bowls terms (Australia apart) a young team with an average age of 38.

The men's team's two silver medals and a bronze in Cardiff against formidable opposition, can be considered good hunting.

I admired Breitenbach's humble, laconic "he was just too good on the day..." after his Irish opponent had won the singles final with a flourish.

The women have been something of a curate's egg. There is little doubt, when the mood takes them they are as good as any other side in the world.

And while one would never doubt their sincerity, determination and skill, somehow, sometimes, they have a habit of snatching defeat from the jaws of ultimate victory – having done what appears to be most of the hard work.



This event is an example.

After the preliminaries - normally the hardest part of any round robin event is to qualify for a play-off – our South Africa women Proteas, with an average age of only 44, had a hint of gold in all four disciplines.

Riding high was the only phrase of which I could think when it came to play-off time.

In the singles, the amazing Colleen Piketh reached the quarter-finals with ease, then faltered against a highly though-of Malaysian champion.

Similarly, the fours side of Eden's bubbly, brilliant Elma Davis, skipping Sable's unflappable Nici Neal, Boland youthful star Anneke Snyman, still only 24 and highly experienced Bronwyn Webber of Port Natal met a Canadian side they would beat on 99 days out of 100, but crashed out to a disastrous 18-3 defeat – inexplicable.

Piketh and Neal, old buddies and long-time partners at top level, strode through the pairs play-offs with a 20-8 clobbering of Canada, but were blitzed by Australia in the semis; unable to reproduce their rhythm they were uncharacteristically overwhelmed 25-3.

The trips of Davis, Snyman, Webber had dominated their section and then saw off a determined a skilful Jersey side to reach the finals.

But the sting deserted them and a 19-9 disappointment meant a great silver, but...

That they women ended with a silver and two bronze medals is highly commendable – but they might rue missed chances, without, let me add, detracting from their opponents on the day and notwithstanding their own aspirations.

To have done so brilliantly in the slog to reach the play-offs, they must have been disappointed they could not secure their ultimate goals.

But there will be more to come. The international diary is packed with major events and this team and others in the wings will have resolve to take South Africa back to the pinnacle of men's and women's bowls.

At the Bowls SA AGM held in Johannesburg in August, the incumbent executive was re-elected en bloc and the following motions approved by council.

Motions adopted:

- To increase affiliation fees due to Bowls SA for each member from 1 January 2019 to R 225 p.a. VAT inclusive. This represents a 4.7 % increase.
- To allow the executive to make appropriate transfers from the general reserve account to such funds as is necessary to fulfil the strategic goals of the Federation.
- That the item GENERAL on the agenda in all future Bowls South Africa workshops be allowed to accommodate a general discussion by the districts.

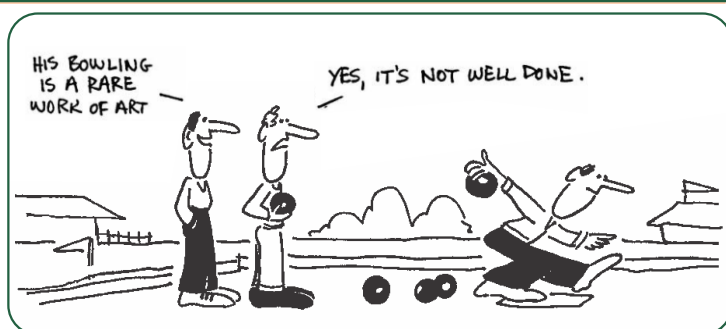

UPDATED Z-SQUAD PROTOCOL

An updated Protocol for the Zone Talent Development Programme, commonly known as Z-Squad shows two changes:

1. Bowls are removed by the scorers as they come to rest and the score noted for 20-20 and attacking exercises. NB: Bowls are still not removed for the target exercises.
2. The target-mat should be laid for the control exercise with its length across the centre-line.

Protocol should be followed to ensure countrywide consistency across the country.

All districts are requested to ensure a minimum of FOUR dates, at least one month apart, are built into their annual calendar/fixture lists, and to ensure the scheduled events occur. These dates must be sent to:

WHEELCHAIR SPECIFICATIONS/REGULATIONS

All wheelchairs must be equipped with four pneumatic tyres with a minimum of two 620 x 45 mm (24" x 1 3/4") rear tyres and two 200 x 50 mm (4" x 2") front tyres or alternatively a front wheel of min 50mm width that raises the front two caster wheels off the level of the green. The rear tyre should have a normal bicycle tread. BMX, mountain bike type tyres are not acceptable unless covered with duct tape or

inner tube to the satisfaction of the jury of appeal.

Regulations: Bowlers playing from wheelchairs to ensure that their wheels run in a straight line directly onto and off the mat.

Players playing with and/or against players in wheelchairs are requested to please position the mat a minimum of 3m from the ditch so as to provide additional green space for all.

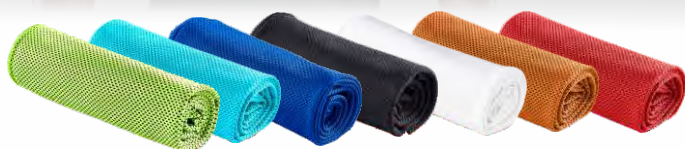
